SOARING WITH EAGLES

Dana Mark Bales had the honor of being the first passenger his son, Ross, took for a glider ride, having obtained his pilot certificate last week. Dana reports that: "It was a beautiful day for flying, and Ross showed some excellent flying skills. The high point of our flight, however, was when a bald eagle decided to join us. He cut across in front of us

THAT CRYSTAL BALL DAN FOUND SEEMS TO WORK



Anyway, they all returned except Joe who was reported at an Amish farm NW of Richmond.

LOOK AT ALL THOSE CU'S



This satellite picture taken at 4:15 PM last Saturday shows what the crystal ball from last Tuesday anticipated. The low overcast of the morning changed into nice soaring weather. The heavy clouds of the passed cold front can be seen to the southeast of Ohio. The nice fluffy clouds over Ohio are what we are looking for, but on Saturday if you went too far west into Indiana, the clouds became big resulting in over-development in some areas. If you fly your glider into one of these overdeveloped areas, it causes your glider to land in an Amish alfalfa field as demonstrated by glider EZ. Sunday also had weather which produced good clouds enabling good flights. There were flights of 500 kilometer, 400k, 300k, 250k and several other good flights.

ASTRONOMY AT SEPTEMBER POT LUCK

We have a special treat on Saturday evening – Dean Regas of the Cincinnati Observatory and the PBS weekly program "Star Gazers" will make an astronomical related presentation after dinner. No math or science skills are needed, just sit back and enjoy.

Dean has been the Outreach Astronomer for the Cincinnati Observatory since 2000 and the co-host of the syndicated astronomy program Star Gazers since 2010, but he has always been a teacher.

After graduating from Xavier University, with an education degree he taught many different subjects including history, government, science, nature education, and even trail construction.

But the stars captured him in 1998 when he began working at Cincinnati's intimate Wolff Planetarium. It was there that Dean discovered his real passion for space and has since become a national popularizer of astronomy and an expert in observational astronomy, star identification, mythology, and myth debunking.

Dean is a contributor to Sky and Telescope Magazine and Astronomy Magazine, and in 2008 he won the Astronomy Magazine "Out-of-this-World" Award for astronomy education. He has written over 100 astronomy articles for the Cincinnati Enquirer and Community Press and recently began blogging for the Huffington Post. Dean is a frequent guest on National Public Radio's *Science Friday* and is regularly featured on local television and radio whenever an exciting astronomical event comes to a sky near you.

At the Cincinnati Observatory he has developed his skills as a dynamic writer and public speaker who brings the complicated field of astronomy down to Earth for students of all ages. Hope to see you there. - JoAnne Pedersen

RUN-A-MUCK FARM, SURELY NOT OUR CCSC

Dear Wilber,

Will, may I call you Will? Seems like you've been on my mind a lot lately this late summer here in SW Ohio. With the soaring weather being exceptional, I guess it brings out everyone to the old glider farm, those guys who work to stay current and proficient and are "in the moment" (if you get my drift) and those folks who just love the outdoors and seem to wander around with their heads in the clouds. There may be a middle ground somewhere between these two points, but it escapes my vision at present.

Since I last communicated with you, (the dog running on the flight line) we've had several events that confound my sense of balance and I thought I'd share them with you to get a perspective from a wise old bird's stand point. Since last, we've had a runway incursion with a glider in tow, interrupting a take off tow event, a couple of glider retrieves down the middle of the runway during tow operations, at least one glider assembly on the launch line complete with tow vehicle and trailer, a student pilot doing his thing over another airfield in the middle of a TFR'd air show, and a near gear up glider landing. What do you think? Is this a normal weekend operation? Is there a common thread? Any ideas Wise One?

Dear Confused,

Wow! You sure have an inventive bunch there at the Glider Farm. You're lucky to be writing me and not your insurance company, or worse, the next of kin. You've asked me if there is a common thread and I'd say, definitely yes. What your bunch seems to lack is a profound culture of safety compounded by a reluctance of the crew chiefs to take charge of their operations. Unless each member considers it his or her duty to be a safety observer, it falls on the shoulders of the crew chief to run a safe operation. This means that the crew chief needs to know his crew, their strengths and limitations, and properly brief those pilots and others who come onto the flight line, of the daily situation. That brief ought to include any standard procedures he uses, such as retrieve lanes, launch points, glider assembly and grid requirements, weather conditions, TFR's and end of the day procedures. These things ought to be part of your SOP (standard operating procedure). You do have an SOP right? Until you do I'd suggest you need to change your name to Run A Muck Farm.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS FOR AUGUST

YTD income was \$18,404 unfavorable to plan at the end of August, but \$11,147 of that is from payment of SSA dues in August instead of in September as budgeted. Overall, the financial situation is still looking good and there is a good chance that we will end the year exactly breaking even. No fuel was purchased in August, so the fuel index remains at \$0.40 per 100 feet. There is ample cash on hand to cover the anticipated expenses during the next three months.

BYLAW CHANGES PROPOSED

Several changes to the bylaws are being proposed for approval of the membership at the November 11, 2014, Annual Meeting. The first clarifies the SSD stock requirements for "Inactive" members. The others bring the wording up to date relative to technology used for retaining club records and providing notice of club functions. The full text of each of these proposed changes will be provided in the next Frequent Flyer.

ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

The two-year terms of the following will expire at the Annual Meeting in November: Jim Dudley, John Dudley, Tim Christman and Mark Schababerle. If you would consider serving the club as a trustee, please prepare a brief resume and send it to the Secretary, <u>John Dudley</u>. He will be preparing ballots for proxy voting and the brief resume will be used along with the ballot to introduce you to the members.

HIGHLIGHTS OF SSA DIRECTORS MEETING - JOHN LUBON

Here are some top lines from the SSA Directors Meeting I attended in Charlotte on Sept 13.

Last year SSA has gained 1500 new members but lost 1700 members. This along with other areas of increasing cost has triggered a long overdue dues increase. Note there has not been an increase in 13 years.

The SSA has pledged support of \$35,000 for a documentary on soaring. The Cloudstreet "Soaring the America West" program should air nationally on PBS sometime next year. It could reach up to 200 million viewers.

The Perlan project which is a pressurized glider capable of flying up to 90,000 feet may be ready for flight next year. The SSA has \$15,000 allocated to supply some of the special high altitude instrumentation.

Some Committee Leaders have changed: Ken Sorenson has stepped down as Competition Committee Chairman and has been replaced by John Good; Linda Murray has stepped down from the Site Selection Committee and I have agreed to take this position.

Other items around the region:

The need for Program Letters is being challenged with the FAA

The Blanik L13 is still grounded in the US with no line of sight on a solution

Lack of instructors and examiners is a common problem.

The editor of Soaring Magazine – Chuck Coyne has resigned in the past week. The SSA is looking for a replacement.

The Badge and Record keeper has also resigned recently. There is some compensation for this position if anyone is interested. - John Lubon, Region 6 Director
