REFURBISHING N3616Q - WEEK 17

The 16Q Crew has completed preparing 2-33 16Q for spraying. Next we'll go over the fuselage looking for rough spots in the pinked tapes and finish installing the drain grommets and then shoot the first coat of Poly Spray, which is a clear coat. Next step is to wet sand the fuselage lightly, clean and begin the silver UV coats followed by the color, which will be a medium Navy Grey overall. At this point we'll move the fuselage out into the hangar, cover it with plastic and move the wing(s) into the shop. Bob Miller will take over the effort stripping the wings in preparation for painting them. Currently, the right wing is being re-skinned at Cubby's so the stripping effort can take place starting the first week of April.

Much effort by many folks has resulted in getting the fuselage to the point of being ready for painting. Take a few minutes and drop into the shop for a look. I think you'll be impressed.- Steve Statkus

CREW ACTIVITIES

Going into 3/20 I was thinking we would have a slim chance to fly after the rain on Saturday. With much surveying of the field, I determined that we could safely operate from the east end. Keith did a pre-check and landed in the glider area and announced that it was tearing up the sod. So, we kept launches and landings between the 2nd and 3rd furrows. Winds were 310 at 10 gusting to 18.

Cloudbases started near 2500 agl, and progressed to about 3600 agl.

Between about 1:30 and 3:30 seemed to be the best of the day. Then high cirrus moved in and winds picked up from about 340 at 15.

We had 9 flights over a 6 hour period with only one instructor.

We tried the new retrieve procedure and it seemed to work well. May have to adjust the "gateway" area. It was close to were the tent would have been. Might suggest moving west 10-15 feet from tent and then the 60' gateway window.

I went to pull a few VHF radios and they were either not plugged into the cradles or the charge timer is not working. I found 2 radios that had about 1/2 charge and used those two for the day, and they were almost dead by end of the day. I checked the charging cables and everything seemed to be connected.- Brian Stoops.

Impromptu FLYING

Often the best soaring weather occurs on days other than Saturday, Sunday, or even Wednesday. When it appears that the soaring will be above average the next day (say a strong cold front is passing and behind it the conditions look good) someone with an urge to fly will send out an email to everyone who is on a list. If a few other pilots are available to join the fun and someone volunteers to fly the tow plane, then all who want to can fly. The way you get your email address onto that distribution list is to send an email to Jim Dudley and ask. Right now there are 39 on the list, so there is room for you also. There is no crew on duty those impromptu flying days, so the policy is that everyone helps out and everyone flies. If you are willing to serve as a tow pilot let me know so your email can be added also.

GREEN TRAINING AIDS

Many members of the club may have seen two paintings on the concrete pad in front of the barn and wondered what they are. They were put there a long time ago and their utility may have been lost in time. A little explanation may be helpful to both students and instructors.

The green paintings are replicas of the gliderport runway in two different scales for two different purposes. They are a bit faded but still visible on Google Earth. We plan to liven them up a little this spring. The smaller painting is designed so that the eye level of the average person on foot is about 2000 feet. The average pace of an adult male on this scale is about 1000 feet.. So: if your glider has a glide ratio of say - 20 to 1, you can take 20 paces away from the "runway" and look back to see what the gliderport looks like at the limit of your gliding ability to get back with 1000 feet left to fly a pattern. Most students are surprised to see that the gliderport is a LONG way off. This is a good lesson to learn to keep the position of the gliderport in mind at all times to avoid a landout.

The club has had a number of incidents where pilots tried to fly normal landing patterns when they didn't have enough altitude to do that. The second runway replica is designed such that the average person's eye level is about 800 feet which is where you should be in the middle of the downwind leg. You can walk around this replica and see what the runway looks like when you are at 800 feet in the wrong place, maybe even aimed in the wrong direction. Then you can ask yourself "what am I gonna do now?" The lesson here is: think far enough ahead to avoid getting yourself in such a position. - Jim Hurst

WILMINGTON ACTIVITY LEVEL HAS INCREASED

Be aware that there is significantly more flight activity at Wilmington. The Class D airspace is only 11 statute miles east of CCSC and a runway is less than 16 miles from our field. Stay vigilant for traffic.John Atkins
