YOUTH CAMP RENAMED YOUTH EDUCATION WEEK (YEW) - STEVE McMANUS

Hello CCSC and CCYSA Colleagues:

Over the years CCSC / CCYSA have had some great success with youth and together we have made a big difference in the lives of many young men and women. While some have gone on to become professional pilots, most have found their way to fulfilling professional careers in other fields such as: Engineering (most common), Medical (1 doctor, 1 researcher and 1 nurse), Film making /entrepreneur, Crew Chief (Marines), I could go on. While we all differ in our motivation with this program I think we all share a common interest in youth that is focused on achieving an accomplishment: Solo then Pilot license.

The purpose of this article is to inform you that CCYSA is renaming the Youth Camp: (YEW). As many of you know working toward solo and/or on to License requires ... work. We have come to realize the word Youth Camp has a connotation that is perhaps confusing parents and first time youths with a false expectation: bouncing balls, jump ropes, camp fire sing-alongs and it is a week for bored youth to play games all week. Every year we get lots of inquiries from parents searching to place their son or daughter in a camp and a "Youth flying camp" sounds too cool to pass up. In these cases we have to screen them out in an attempt to pick out the most interested and enthusiastic youth. Over the years we have been reducing the attendee capacity from 25 to 18, 16 and now 15. The cap of 15 is not a guarantee we will allow 15 students in camp it may be fewer than 15. This has been done to strengthen our educational quality and instructor availability. Believe it or not instructors like engaged serious students.

Coupled with the new name, Youth Education Week (YEW), the CCYSA Board has established rules for attendance, see below. Returning youth still get a priority; however, they must show they are interested in learning and being at camp. New attendees have to meet the minimum criteria to get on

the "waiting list". That does not mean that if you meet the minimum criteria then you are automatically selected for YEW.


Criteria.

- 1. New attendees minimum selection criteria to be listed on the current year waiting list:
 - a) Must be CCSC youth member (at least 6 weeks- this is so they can join CCSC, fly and attend crew training).
 - b) Must have taken at least 1 instructional flight.
 - c) Must have a written recommendation by 2 of the 3: CCSC Crew chief, CCSC instructor and/or CCYSA Board member.
- 2. Returning CCYSA students have priority over new candidates but only if they:
 - a) Have had at least 3 flights since the prior encampment;
 - b) Are assigned to and have attended at least one crew day since prior camp (out of state members get a pass for item b only);
 - c) Have completed all pre solo tests (2017 attendance exception: if not they must complete the test before they can fly).

CCYSA has been the lucky recipient of generous donations from which we have established scholarships to help students with their flying costs. If you know of a youth who would benefit from a scholarship in pursuit of flight training: solo, private, commercial or instructor license/rating please let us know. While scholarship amount varies every year we try to work with the CCSC instructors, crew chiefs, tow pilots and members in the nomination process. A CCSC/CCYSA youth may be proposed for a scholarship by anyone by bringing the nominee to the attention of a CCSC instructor, CCSC Crew Chief, CCSC Tow pilot or CCYSA Board member. If nominated, the nominee will be required to write and submit an essay for consideration.

CCSC OPERATIONS OVERVIEW

Rolf has been looking at the data for club operations and has provided some interesting plots. The PRIVATE TOTAL includes flights by members in their own gliders and flights by guests in their own gliders primarily at contests. The gap is because of a lack of data for 1998 and 1999. Weather has



been a problem for several years, but there appear to be trends that are stronger than the influence of weather. The good news is the increasing utilization of the club fiberglass fleet.

SATURDAY - DICK HOLZWARTH

Field conditions dictated a reduced tempo of operations. We operated from a two lane zone of the main runway on the east end. The south side of the field on both the east and west ends was still very wet and soft, but there was enough usable field on the north side for careful operations using runway 27. There were a total of 10 flights, including flight reviews for 4 members. The field was being rolled before operations began at approx 11:30 and rolling resumed when operations shut down approx 15:30.

SUNDAY-BRIAN STOOPS

The weather was beautiful with light NE winds and much sunlight. A handful of people came out to enjoy the sun. The main north side of the runway was the most solid so 2-33 flights were asked to land on south side to keep the main north side open for the K21 and Grob. In all there were 18 flights one which included a tow to 5K. - Brian Stoops, substituting for Dave Menchen

ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING - WEDNESDAY, APRIL 12, 2017

NEW HELP FINDING SOMEONE TO SWAP CREW DAY ASSIGNMENTS

A new web-based process for facilitating swapping crew day assignments was announced in the 2/21/2017 Frequent Flyer along with instructions for using the system. This process is intended to help members find another member who will agree to swap crew duties for one specific set of dates. It is **not** for getting reassigned to a different crew for an indefinite period. Brian Stoops is the person who oversees crew assignments, so Brian is the one to whom you need to speak about a long term change.

Remember that **UOP 2.2 CREW MEMBER DUTIES** states: "All crew members are to report for duty at 9:30 AM and work until released by the Crew Chief. Each crew member is personally responsible for arranging for a qualified substitute in case of his or her absence. Scheduled crew members are expected to be present for each of their scheduled crew days regardless of flying conditions." This new process does not relieve any crew member of the responsibility for arranging for a qualified substitute and informing the crew chief; rather it is intended to help accomplish that task.

SPRING CLEANUP DAYS, APRIL 1-2 - HENRY MEYERROSE

Caesar Creek Soaring <u>Club</u> has a long tradition of taking care of our equipment and facilities ourselves in order to keep the cost of flying reasonable. With a clubhouse, farmhouse, barn, hangars, runway, roads, campground, grounds equipment and aircraft to keep operating efficiently and safely and also to keep everything looking attractive there is much work to be done. Each crew is expected to take care of the urgent small projects on their crew day, but the club sets aside a weekend in the spring for the whole club to join together to complete some of the big projects. In addition to the normal spring cleanup work on the grounds. This year we have a couple of big projects that are very important.

Our runway has holes and bumps that must be smoothed. We will need 10-15 people to find all the problem areas in the runway and mark them. Then we will fill in the holes and low sections of drainage ditchs and level the bumps before rolling the entire runway, planting grass seed where needed, etc.

A second big project for this spring is the exterior of the farmhouse. We will need 4-6 people to pressure wash the siding in preparation for painting later. Repairs are also needed on the siding in some areas and some of the foundation flashing also needs repair. The list continues to grow and these maintenance tasks are essential for protecting the structure from decay. The farmhouse is a significant asset that we want to maintain in good condition.

Other projects will include items such as removing the pine needles that have collected in the gutters over the entrance to the office, cleaning out the flower beds around the clubhouse and spreading new mulch, removing dead wood from the campground, etc.

If we do not each contribute to this effort then we will all end up paying more for our flying. Plan now to join in the effort on April 1-2.

IMPROMPTU FLYING

Often the best soaring weather occurs on days other than Saturday, Sunday or even Wednesday. When it appears that the soaring will be above average the next day or two (say a strong cold front is passing and behind it the conditions look good) someone with an urge to fly will send out an email to everyone who is on a list. If a few other pilots are available to join the fun and someone volunteers to fly the tow plane, then all can fly. The way you get your email address onto that distribution list is to send an email to Jim Dudley and ask. Right now there are 42 on the list, so there is room for you also. There is no crew on duty those impromptu flying days, so the policy is that everyone helps out and everyone flys. If you are willing to serve as a tow pilot let Jim know so your email can be added also.

NEW PANEL FOR MARK MILLER'S DG-600

Mark Miller sent this photo soon after he and Dan finished installing a new vario and other accessories in his DG-600. The editor had to ask what happens when the "Panic Button" is pressed. Mark's prompt answer was, "When circling low over crop fields press the panic button. It automatically sends a text to the crew chief to take up a collection and send lawyers, guns and money." Mark also had to explain to the editor that the instrument at the bottom center is his transponder! With all that equipment Mark is now all set for the

ANNUAL FIELD FLIGHT REVIEW REQUIRED NOW

Remember that CCSC has a requirement that each member complete an annual CCSC Field Flight Review with a CCSC instructor and get the instructor's endorsement in his/her logbook prior to acting as PIC of any CCSC glider (UOP 4.2-Pilot Qualifications). Your first CCSC glider flight of the year must be with an instructor. Many members have already taken advantage of the good winter days we have enjoyed to get the requirement completed well in advance of the great spring soaring that is sure to follow. You will want to spend your time soaring then, not waiting for your turn to do the Flight Review. Also, check your logbook. Do you need to complete the FAR 61.56 Flight Review this year? If so, why not combine the two flight reviews and get both completed when they will not interfere with the soaring you want to do during the great weather later this year.
