YEW-2019 A HUGE SUCCESS



Fourteen youth spent the past week at CCSC learning to fly gliders. Only a few of the 47 volunteers who made YEW possible were available for this photo Friday morning. Thank you to all volunteers for your contribution to the lives of these youth!

Fortunately, the weather cooperated enough to permit some flying each day: Monday: 23 flights (despite the constant threat of rain which finally arrived mid-afternoon); Tuesday: 32 flights (despite gusting cross winds parts of the day); Wednesday: 23 flights (despite the threat of rain that delayed flying until afternoon. The canoe trip that was considered as a backup plan in case of inclement weather had to be cancelled because the river was too high and there was a threat of an even faster release from the dam according to the canoe rental operator.) Thursday: 45 flights and Friday: 26 flights (despite lingering low overcast and the oppressive heat) for a total of 149 youth training flights for the five days. The safety record was unblemished with no noteworthy injuries to any campers or volunteers and no damage to any of the gliders. Steve Statkus who served as crew chief several days commented that he did not observe a single bad landing all week!

GROUND SCHOOL

More than 15 hours of ground school were conducted during the week. For instance, on Wednesday there was a class to prepare the pre-solo students for the final written exam that they needed to pass before receiving the signoff to solo.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR YOUTH TO LEARN TO SOAR

The ceremony at the close of YEW-2019 included recognition for two youth who have received and benefitted from scholarships to help them learn to fly: Booker Atkins and Christian Maurer. Both have received scholarships from CCYSA and from SSA. They explained the process for applying for scholarships so that other youth could apply next year and they talked about what it takes to succeed: a goal, planning, persistence, focused work, etc.

REAR SEAT CHECKOUT IN 2-33 FOR CHRISTIAN MAURER

Christian selected N36135 for his check out in the rear seat with his uncle, Manfred, in the front seat in the role of CFI-G. This is a special aircraft for Christian because it is the aircraft in which both he and his dad completed their first solo flights (both at age 14, 35 years apart). Now Christian is working on his commercial glider rating and already has set a goal for a CFI-G, also a family tradition since his grandfather, Otto, was an instructor for the club for many years.

While Saturday was brutally hot, Sunday was less brutal and met with optimism. Since we were left with only a K21 and three 2-33's, we got them all out and started flying at 10:35. There was just enough of a breeze to keep the sweat down and the horse flies biting.

To keep a long story short, by 14:30 a line of storms moved in from the S/SW and wind picked up and switched from 230° at 7 to about 180° at 20. It was time to call it quits. Charlie DeBerry's grandson, Bridger, was working on a solo, but when the wind picked up, we had to quickly cancel that finale. I was able to catch this photo of Charlie and his Grandson on a pre-solo check ride. I am sure he can finish it next time.

Now of the details. We had 11 flights, and no equipment issues... wait a minute. Scratch that... 909 was over by 20 hours for its oil change and 33Z had a broken tailwheel spring and 48L was not recommended for flying in this heat. So which tow plane shall we use? Thank God we have some trained mechanics on staff that swapped out a spring from 48L to fix 33Z so it could fly, and then Tony B. went to Waynesville to get 2 cases of oil and 2 filters so that Tim Christman could change the oil in 909.

CCSC TEAM IN 9TH PLACE IN OLC USA GOLD LEAGUE AT END OF ROUND 14

In Round 14 of the OLC USA Gold League competition only John Lubon submitted a scoreable flight for the CCSC team. He flew Saturday from CCSC and flew for two hours and twenty-seven minutes to get a distance score of 130 km and an average speed of 52 km/hr. Not bad given the conditions over Ohio with the wind breaking up the scattered thermals and the cloud cover blocking half the sun's energy most of the time. Although that flight only won 14th place for our team, it still garnered one point toward the overall score. Four other teams did not manage to submit any scoreable flights and two other teams got only the one "participation point". So, at the end of 14 rounds the CCSC team is now ranked 9th out of 18 teams in the USA Gold League competition.

HELP FINDING SOMEONE TO SWAP CREW DAY ASSIGNMENTS

A web-based process for facilitating swapping crew day assignments was announced in the 2/21/2017 Frequent Flyer along with instructions for using the system. This process is intended to help members find another member who will agree to swap crew duties for one specific set of dates. It is not for getting reassigned to a different crew for an indefinite period. Mark Miller is now the person who oversees crew assignments, so Mark is the one to whom you need to speak about a long-term change.

Remember that UOP 2.2 CREW MEMBER DUTIES states: "All crew members are to report for duty at 9:30 AM and work until released by the Crew Chief. Each crew member is personally responsible for arranging for a qualified substitute in case of his or her absence. Scheduled crew members are expected to be present for each of their scheduled crew days regardless of flying conditions." This new process does not relieve any crew member from the responsibility for arranging for a qualified substitute and informing the crew chief; rather it is intended to help accomplish that task. As of 7:00 pm on 7/23/2019 there is one request for a member to swap or substitute a crew day.
