No flying due to solid overcast. With low visibility and the ceiling over the field forecast not rise above 1500' AGL through 7PM there was no flying. But Andrew Dignan was busy installing new electronic door latches for the clubhouse and office.

# NEW ELECTRONIC DOOR HANDLE FOR CLUB HOUSE -ANDREW DIGNAN



There is a new key-less electronic door lock system on the club house. A code is required to activate the outside door handle to open the door. (same code as old key box). When the code is entered correctly, the top-most button will flash green and you can open the door with the handle. It will stay operational for about 5 seconds and then disengage again.

Once in the clubhouse, you can flip the bolt latch knob on the inside of the door handle to the "open" position. You do that by turning it counterclockwise 90 degrees, so it is vertical. You will hear a click from the door lock and at that point the outside door handle will operate the door mechanism without need to enter the code. The inside door handle is always "engaged" and will always work the door

bolt.

When you close the clubhouse up for the end of the day, turn the bolt latch clockwise 90 degrees to the horizontal position. You will hear a click from the lock and at that point the outside handle will no longer work the door catch.

#### HELP FINDING SOMEONE TO SWAP CREW DAY ASSIGNMENTS

A web-based process for facilitating swapping crew day assignments was announced in the 2/21/2017 Frequent Flyer along with instructions for using the system. This process is intended to help members find another member who will agree to swap crew duties for one specific set of dates. It is not for getting reassigned to a different crew for an indefinite period. Mark Miller is now the person who oversees crew assignments, so Mark is the one to whom you need to speak about a long-term change.

Remember that UOP 2.2 CREW MEMBER DUTIES states: "All crew members are to report for duty at 9:30 AM and work until released by the Crew Chief. Each crew member is personally responsible for arranging for a qualified substitute in case of his or her absence. Scheduled crew members are expected to be present for each of their scheduled crew days regardless of flying conditions." This new process does not relieve any crew member from the responsibility for arranging for a qualified substitute and informing the crew chief; rather it is intended to help accomplish that task. As of 3:00 pm on 9/10/2019 there is one request for a member to swap or substitute a crew day.
