## Operations - COVID changes! - Mark Miller

Unfortunately due to the dramatic rise in COVID cases in Ohio and Warren County the BOD is reinstating effective immediately the following rules:

- No introductory or guest rides
- No non-members allowed at the Club
- Masks are required inside, and outside when social distancing is not possible. Masks are required when two people are flying together in a club ship. This is regardless of vaccination status.

The BOD will re-evaluate this decision at the next meeting to see if the numbers are decreasing enough to return to normal. When the BOD relaxed the restrictions in June the daily average COVID rate in Warren County was at 1 case per 100K. That only rose to 2 in July, but as of 7 Aug it has risen to 16 and the rate of increase was up to 161%. Ohio has also risen from single digits to a daily average of 13 per 100K.

## Last month in review - Tom McDonald

We had 1261 flights through the end of August, compared to 919 at the same time last year. The month of July was down a bit year-over-year due to a couple of rainy weekends. Numbers for August 2020 and 2021 were almost identical, 267 and 268. Finances are looking good all around.

There are now 4 radios in the crew chief lockers, all of which are numbered. The numbered radios must match with their charging cradles; particularly number one since it is a lithium ion battery. That cradle requires the radio to be pushed back to align the tabs for it to slip down for charging. All four charging lights should be on.

There is a spare battery on the shelf or in the bag on the second shelf down on the right. If there are any problems, let Rolf know.

We haven't forgotten about Condor in the clubhouse. The desktop computer needed a serious upgrade to run the VR goggles. That's is now complete, and we expect to complete the installation this coming weekend. It will be at the opposite end of the clubhouse from the existing computer. Note that there are no club funds tied up in this project. Software, hardware and the desk are all donated.


# **CCSC Cross Country Camp Report By Henry and Michael Hayter and Chuck Lohre**



Larry Kirkbride reminded everyone that you don't want to use the first 1000' of runway at Clinton since dangerous rotors form on both ends because of the terrain east and west of the north south strip.





On Tuesday, John Lubon gave his Thermaling Presentation at the 10:30 am educational session.

John has lots of tips to share, a popular one is that above 2000' AGL look up at the clouds and below 2000' AGL look down for thermal triggering land features as well as good fields to land in.





John Lubon and Dan Reagan delivered a presentation on using OLC, Online Contest, to review other's flights and to meet fellow glider pilots from all over the world. The image shows our local OLC rookie, Chris Summers, leading the pack with 1064.87 points.

Monday afternoon, CCSC President, Andrew Dignan, set up a Condor Glider Simulator task for CCSC to Moraine, Green County and back. Andrew won the day flying a blazing 81 mph average speed. Left to right: David Kerrigan, Michael Hayter and Jonathan Hart took turns on the one rig. Chuck Lohre came in second. We all flew the Standard Cirrus.

Late in the day on Tuesday John Lubon got to fly for a short time with David and Jonathan. Those were the last flights of the week for them all.

Tow pilots: Don Green, John Armor, Haskell Simpkins, Fred Hawk, Christian Maurer, and Sami Rintala were always on deck.




Jonathan Hart brought a beautiful Libelle all the way from Washington State. The whole family tagged along on an extended vacation and an opportunity to link up with family from New York.

Operationally the CCSC Cross Country Camp went smoothly, all gliders were available to fly. Bob Miller completed maintenance on SGS 2-33 "135" Sunday evening so it was available all week. The only minor hiccups were the availability of golf carts and minor damage to SGS 2-33 "16Q" from the main wheel dolly. Steve Statkus repaired 16Q enough to fly on Wednesday. The field was in excellent condition with a grid laid out for the gliders to keep things organized. Jim Goebel mowed out a small runway to practice off-field/spot landings. We had plenty of volunteers to help launch and retrieve gliders. It was not the best soaring weather and we had the threat of rain/thunderstorms on several days. On Tuesday with thunderstorms threatening, the Caesar's Creek ground crew helped several visitors disassemble their gliders, including the Open Cirrus which would give the Grob 103 a run for its money and difficulty.

We wrapped up the week on Friday with 25,000 foot dead stick stories from Don Green in his F 104 Starfighter. Michael Hayter and Fred Hawk had a 45 minute flight in the ASK21.

Despite the weather Michael learned a lot from helping assemble and disassemble gliders. Maybe in the future we'll be more flexible with the schedule. If we would have held the camp the week before, the soaring was great. A few pilots would have had a tough time scheduling around work but many participants are students on vacation or retired.

At the April board meeting we approved the Land's End embroidered CCSC patch for use on their clothing line website. Go to <a href="http://business.landsend.com/store/ccsc">http://business.landsend.com/store/ccsc</a> select your garment or promotional product and then select the "APPLY LOGO(S)" box. I created the CCSC Patch for general club use. For my own personal use, I created the embroidery of my call sign "6V" and the ASW 15 planeform for the sleeves. If you would like your call sign or planeform created, send me a

photo of your tail, the one-time cost is \$29 each to create the embroidery programming. Most of our planeforms are on the back of our silk screened t-shirts in the club house. The sizes run large, I got my usual XL shirt and it's too large for me. Only some of the promotional items are available one at a time for embroidery. My shirt, shown, cost \$35.95, plus \$8.95 for the patch and \$6.95 each for the sleeves. They will also charge you tax and my shipping was \$9.95.
