WHAT IS A GLIDING COMPETITION? BY ADAM WOOLLEY

It's one of those questions we get asked by our colleagues at work quite often, or by random people at the gas station after they've asked, what on earth is in that trailer? I find it quite an enjoyable conversation to have because it's quite engaging. I thought I'd give it a go here, maybe you might get hooked & want to give it a go too.

There are so many great things about a gliding competition, I'm not even sure I could pick out my favorite aspect, but if I were forced to, it would be the camaraderie with friends, often from all sides of the state, country, or world. It's a great way to meet old & new friends, that you wouldn't otherwise normally see or hang out with. Naturally, the camaraderie also brings a lot of fun, both in the skies comparing your skills or craft, but also on the ground when meeting for coffee & breakfast, or cooking up a BBQ with a hard earned beer of an afternoon .

Gliding competitions as I know them are races, but they do come in forms of aerobatics. So how do we race? How long is a competition?

Typically a glider race is flown from a nominated start point near the airfield, then to point A, then to point B, then back to the home airfield. The task lengths depend on the weather for the day, they can range from 150km up to 600km (30 to 50 KM for 1-26). Typically the competitors will be on task for 3-4 hours (1 to 3 hours for 1-26), so as you can imagine, the speeds range from, very slow to very fast in this case.

The competitors in a typical gliding competition will all get towed up to 2000'agl, then once the last pilot releases, the start gate will be declared open in 20 minutes' time. After this, the competitors are free to choose when they want to start to achieve the best average speed over the set course. Start too early and those who start later will probably catch you up due to the stronger conditions, but on the other hand, start too late & there may be very weak or no thermals to be able to let you finish the task at all.

Typically, the winner for the day will achieve 1000pts, naturally because they achieved the fastest overall speed. Everyone else will get a percentage of this winner's score. Gliding competitions are run over 7-12 day (8 days for 1-26) periods, so the person with the most amount of points at the end of the championships wins.

Gliding competitions are held at your club level, state level, national level & of course the international level. They can not only be run like the format above but also like a Grand Prix, where all the pilots start at the same time & first past the post wins.

Gliding competitions are a lot of fun, you can learn so much from flying them. Often people will say, I learned more here about cross-country flying in 7 days than I have done in my 500 hrs of solo flying at home. I highly recommend that you give it a go someday, challenge yourself & most importantly, have fun.

One final tip though if you're going to your first competition, make sure you do it under the guidance of a mentor, it'll make it a lot more fun. They can help you prepare for the competition, what to bring, more of what to expect, etc. If you haven't got a mentor from your club, be sure to contact the competition director andsee if he can help you arrange one at the site you're going to.

You're going to have a lot of fun, enjoy the experience & journey!

OPERATIONS

CREW CHIEF REPORTS 2ND SATURDAY REPORT

17 flights. Narrow-field operations using runway 9. Good student flying day. Used both 2-33s and ASK-21 CC. 909 was the only towplane in use.

No safety or operational issues to report. Radios: When we opened the crew chiefs locker, radio chargers 1 and 2 glowed green, all others red. We took all the radios to the line. We operated using 2, and left 3,4, and no number running as a test. 3 died immediately, 4 and no number died after about four hours. When we put them back on chargers end of day, 1 glowed green, 2,3,4, no number glowed red. Hopefully, 2nd Sun will find all green, but we suspect radio 3 has a bad battery.

2ND SUNDAY REPORT

It was a beautiful Easter Sunday at the gliderport, with lots of sunshine, temperatures near 60, and 10 kt winds out of the east. We operated on Runway 9 with two towplanes, tow 2-33's, and two ASK-21's. There were 22 flights in all, with several lasting an hour or more.

Two students were briefed on First Sunday ground crew training requirements. They will attend first Sunday training next month if possible. We were unable to find any new member packets in the trailer or the clubhouse. We had no equipment issues. However, the gas pump was found unlocked and turned on this morning.

3RD SATURDAY REPORT

We operated off 27 with 22 flights for the day. By mid afternoon, 33Z had no electric power and could not start. The plane was towed to the hanger and Tim Christman was notified by voicemail.

ODDS AND ENDS

CCSC PHOTO CONTEST - STEVE STATKUS

Photography isn't what it used to be. Today it's referred to as "Iphonography." That's because we all carry that amazing communication device that also doubles as a camera. It's the ultimate point and shoot camera; light, fast, and the exposure takes care of itself. All you have to do is deal with composition. No digging through your camera bag for the right lens as your grand-daughter just kicked the winning goal. Don't ask me how I know this.

If you're like me you'll show the image to a handful of friends then it resides in the ether net. (Does that place still exist?) So, to urge your photographic efforts, the CCSC Board has decided to have an Annual CCSC Photo Contest using that thing in your back pocket. But, if you want to drag out that big clumsy SLR, root in your bag for whatever, deal with exposure, white balance, ISO and focus, go for it. (I'm going for it.)

Here's the plan: Once the field dries and operations begin everyone is invited to photograph: Category 1: gliders/tow planes in flight either from the ground or in flight. For safety purposes no single pilot photos in a club ship and no selfie stick photos out the vent window in a club ship. In club two place ships, the non-flying person can shoot anytime with the above restrictions. Cockpit mug

shot selfies are encouraged but probably won't make the cut, but who can resist?

Category 2: is shots of crew activities. For safety purposes, no photography ahead of the launch line within the 45 degree cone of safety. Other than that anything goes, like arguments about who's on the flight board first and first flight showers.

Category 3: is about club social activities; bon fires, Wednesday winter soup days and summer dinners. Those evenings after flight ops are over and RC flights that occur at sunset are nice.

The process: Take your shot or shots. Annotate the category you want it judged in and send the image to Rolf Hegele, editor with your name and date the photo was taken. (Post processing is allowed within reason.). The photos will be filed by category and may be used in the Frequent Flyer. No limit on submissions. Size of image (pixel count) is TBD.

There will be prizes at the annual banquet.
