1-26 Championships







DAY 1: Mother Nature showed us whose foot is on the throttle the first 3 days of this week; low ceilings and high winds. Displaying her fickle nature, she left town and gave control of the weather to Ms. May who was done with crappy weather around SW Ohio. Ms. May delivered the "GREATEST SOARING WEATHER IN THE HISTORY OF 1-26'S. This statement came from my soaring partner Chuck Lohre who flew 242 today. To put it in perspective, Jeff Daye stated, "I'VE NEVER PASSED UP A 4 KT THERMAL, UNTIL TODAY," We launched 21 gliders at 2 minute intervals into those 4 kt'ers up to cloud base of 5400 ft. MSL. We only had one relight and one out landing at a nearby airport. The race was on! Spirits were high in the club house after the pilots straggled in. The results will be posted tomorrow and we're expecting another banner soaring day.



Can you say Blue Day? I swear Mother Nature is bi-polar. Yesterday will be remembered as "THE 1-26'ERS GREATEST SOARING DAY EVER." And today; SCRATCH FOR YOUR LIVES. Even the sniffer (an ASK-29 with the greatest soaring pilot in our club) found a thermal after about an hour (after which he headed for a cu somewhere far away from CCSC) and suggested we launch the first row of 1-26s. The first off must have thought it was a 200 foot rope break because he/she was back that quick, More on this great experience from a 1-26er in the second row.

But to the 1st day's results. 1 relight! Can you believe that? 17 of the 21 starters achieved distance points. The winner of the day was Curt Lewis with a blistering pace of 35.9 mph which when converted, equates to Mach 1.5 on the Top Gun Maverick BS scale. Second was Chip Haskell blasting around the course at 31.3 mph, (Mach 1.25 corrected.). Third was Jeff Daye at 30.8 mph (Mach 1.18 corrected) which explains the ratty appearance of 039 due to surface heating.

The winning team was Bloomfield and Schwartz at 28.1 mph. They obviously didn't use the afterburner and it took both of the team mates around the course to secure this most prestigious position. The team of Hegele and Regan were only 0.3 mph behind. (See below.)



DAY 3: Saturday May 6^{th,} our weather person (who landed out yesterday on his 3rd 1-26 flight) was

busy putting lipstick on the pig when our CD Wally Berry walked in with a strained look on his face. We all wondered if he'd gotten food poisoning at breakfast. But CM Chuck Lohre started the meeting and after that our weather person (Dan Reagan) gave us the bad news first; cloud cover, max lift 3.1 kts, ceiling 3200 ft. MSL. And then more bad news: winds at cloud base were 18 kts. The good news: two blue patches; the first two hours out and the second maybe tomorrow.

CD Wally said, great contest weather so grid at 1300 and launch the sniffer at 1330. He'd prepared a 3 hour 25 mile task with landing points and a single turn point. We pilots crawled under our wings as the blue patch floated over heading East at 18 kts. "Launch the first row" was the call from the sniffer John Lubon and he went off the air after that piece of encouragement. And so we launched.

I know two thermals came through the start cylinder (at 18 kts) as we waited for the start gate to open. We waited an hour as the other pilots and I circled and drifted down wind and finally Wally opened the gate. With 4800 AGL under my wings I headed on course to enter the start cylinder



on my way to the first turn point into a 10 kt. headwind. And the rest is best forgotten history.

No one made minimum distance but the winner of the day was Chip Haskell with a couple of turn points and a distance of 12.9 miles. The team winners of the day were Ken Butler and Charles Cook with 9.1 miles. We're all anxiously awaiting that second blue hole tomorrow.

Have you seen what Dan and Rolf have done to the 1-26? It has been taped, insulated, installed pool noodles and noise mitigation, an audio vario, and a super secret thermal finder (even though the sensor tufts keep failing). They even washed and waxed the exterior oxidation and also painted the cockpit and the panel and placed bandaids where needed. It's a screaming machine, we just have to learn how to fly it.











This is hard work.



Tomorrow, (Wednesday) is supposed to be another good flying day. Come on out and see what a 1-26 contest is all about (besides the flying). Launches should start shortly after noon.

CCSC PHOTO CONTEST - STEVE STATKUS

Photography isn't what it used to be. Today it's referred to as "Iphonography." That's because we all carry that amazing communication device that also doubles as a camera. It's the ultimate point and shoot camera; light, fast, and the exposure takes care of itself. All you have to do is deal with composition. No digging through your camera bag for the right lens as your grand-daughter just kicked the winning goal. Don't ask me how I know this.

If you're like me you'll show the image to a handful of friends then it resides in the ether net. (Does that place still exist?) So, to urge your photographic efforts, the CCSC Board has decided to have an Annual CCSC Photo Contest using that thing in your back pocket. But, if you want to drag out that big clumsy SLR, root in your bag for whatever, deal with exposure, white balance, ISO and focus, go for it. (I'm going for it.)

Here's the plan: Everyone is invited to photograph: Category 1: gliders/tow planes in flight either from the ground or in flight. For safety purposes no single pilot photos in a club ship and no selfie stick photos out the vent window in a club ship. In club two place ships, the non-flying person can shoot anytime with the above restrictions. Cockpit mug shot selfies are encouraged but probably won't make the cut, but who can resist?

Category 2: is shots of crew activities. For safety purposes, no photography ahead of the launch line within the 45 degree cone of safety. Other than that anything goes, like arguments about who's on the flight board first and first flight showers.

Category 3: is about club social activities; bon fires, Wednesday winter soup days and summer dinners. Those evenings after flight ops are over and RC flights that occur at sunset are nice.

The process: Take your shot or shots. Annotate the category you want it judged in and send the image to Rolf Hegele, editor with your name and date the photo was taken. (Post processing is allowed within reason.). The photos will be filed by category and may be used in the Frequent Flyer. No limit on submissions. Size of image (pixel count) is TBD.

There will be prizes at the annual banquet.

If you would like your call sign or planeform created, send me aphoto of your tail, the one-time cost is \$29 each to create the embroidery programming. Most of our plane forms are on the back of our silk-screened t-shirts in the clubhouse. The sizes runlarge, I got my usual XL shirt and it's too large for me.
