4TH SATURDAY REPORT - ?

4TH SUNDAY REPORT

Winds were mild out of the NE. Glider Operations were on runway 09. It was a busy day at the Glider Club. Al Quinn noticed that 33Z had fuel on the windshield so 909 was used to tow initially. We had 17 total flights. Many student flights and one guest ride. Guest paid by check – a gentleman came out for his 90th birthday. Dan Reagan was his pilot.

Thanks to Jim Goebel and Bill Gabbard for their time and efforts. Jim and Bill both instructed and when 33Z was ready, Jim became our second tow pilot.

909: The left canopy latch needs a new spring. 909 also experience a mild ground loop on a downwind landing – no damage found.

Golf cart charger cables: Cart #6 – was started and driven away still connected to the charger. It was put away with the red jumper laying on the ground behind the cart. This was an unreported incident. The cart was returned with a flat left rear tire, (also not reported.) Cart #5 is burning oil so use as a last resort. A jug of oil is in the basket. This cart will need to be repaired.

There were 3 private ship flights: Dieter, Brian Stoops, and Michael Hayter all flew their private gliders today.

New crew members: Tim and Ian Lynch are new and welcomed members of the 4th Sunday Crew. Thanks to them, and all other crew member who reported for duty, for being there today.

1ST SATURDAY REPORT (EXTRA)

Flight operations were conducted on rinway 09. The tent and trailer were left on the west end of the field because the forecast for Sunday is similar. We had 22 flights, 10 intro flights for the boyscouts were paid via Paypal.

All the Boy Scouts did not have previously signed waivers by their parents. One of the adults emailed the parents sending them the form, the parents signed the forms and returned them to him, he then converted to PDFs and emailed them to BusinessManger@soarccsc.com.

Golf Cart No 2 - Left rear tire went flat. It was inflated and was holding air pressure after 2 hours.

48 L - The starter did not disengage twice. It had trouble starting. The second detent on the flaps does not engage all of the time.

33Z - The headset transmit has issues.

BG - The left shoulder seat pan bolt needs a nut.

G103 - A screw is missing from the trim/brake plate.

1ST SUNDAY REPORT

Beautiful day at the glider port. Many flights lasting over 1 hr. Had a total of 31 flights with one intro ride. Had the following equipment issues: Hardware for making ropes missing from the trailer. Had to scrounge to get enough ropes to operate. Need to order books for the 2-33's for students. The Kubota was low on coolent; seems this is a recurring problem. Had one student solo, Great job to Bret Topham.

Ray Monell is ready to put out on crew.

Dieters cheesecake was great as usual.

1ST SATURDAY REPORT

There was high wind and gusts from the west and north-west. Operations were on runway 27. We had 9 flights.

Both of the new radios were sitting in their chargers but not charging. The new chargers engage the radio a bit differently. When the charger is engaged, the light will come on.

Spare o-rings for the valve stem adapters would be great.

An airliner flew near the field. Data captured by Dan Beans on Flight Radar 24 showed its altitude at 3,672 ft. Glider flights were as high as 4,500 ft MSL. This information was forwarded to Kevin Price.

2ND SUNDAY REPORT

The day turned out better than expected. Strong, gusty winds were forecast, but were relatively light for most of the day. Skies were overcast much of the day, making for better training than soaring. Operations were on Runway 27 with both 2-33's and 1 ASK-21. 22 flights, including 1 introductory flight. Thanks to Brian Stoops for piloting the guest ride.

No equipment issues other than the primary key for 909 could not be located The spare key from the crew chief's locker was used.

548 (1-26) STATUS - STEVE STATKUS

548 is disassembled and stored in the west end of the glider hanger. The damage to the leading edge will require removal and replacement of the damaged L/E panel. This panel is about 5 feet long and is riveted to the top and bottom of the front spar. Removing a L/E D-tube panel is a complex operation requiring cutting access holes in the bottom skin just behind the rear spar, and cutting at least two access holes through the spar web itself. This allows the rivets securing the D-tube section to be "bucked" from the inside of the L/E panel.

I've talked to Cathy Stewart and they can do the job. I've talked with Kyle at K&L Soaring and the cost of materials less paint is about \$250. They also can do the job, less paint for about \$2,000 and get it done on their fixture in a couple of hours. According to Kyle, the use of a fixture is important to preserve alignment as the D-section provides torsional stiffness. I'm not sure Cubby has a fixture, but will ask. And I'm not sure what their time frame is and how long they would need to do the job, but

will have this info by the time of the board meeting.

If we go with K&L (my suggestion) we'll get the wing back with the replacement section unpainted. We can do the paint job for the cost of the paint. I think we'll need one quart of each color, plus thinner and one quart of primer. I'll have the cost for the paint at the meeting. I'd take the wing up to K&L using my trailer and wait for the repair to be made. It's 522 miles each way so It's up, over night and back. Figure \$175 for gas and one night in a motel. I would not leave until we had a hard date for the job from Kyle.

That's what I know at this point. See you at the board meeting.jumper, hang the charge cable on the hanger nearest the smart charger.

(The Board elected to keep the job with Cubby and get it done as soon as possible. Ed)

GOLF CART STATUS - STEVE STATKUS

Golf carts #5 will need a visit to the Cart Doctor due to oil burning, rings and or valves. Estimated cost is \$500. #6 has a flat tire which I removed today and along with another flat was delivered to Lukie Tire for repair. I'll pick them up this Wednesday.

The smart charger on the north wall had it's jumper cable pulled out when some knuckle head drove away without disconnecting the jumper. It will be repaired by Wednesday.
